Sustainable Development Goal 4 and its targets: Provide Quality Education

- Sustainable Development Goal 4 has 10 targets encompassing many different aspects of education. There are seven targets which are expected outcomes and three targets which are means of achieving these targets.
- ► There are also education elements in the targets of several of the other 17 Sustainable Development Goals(link is external).

Seven Outcome Targets

- 4.1 Universal primary and secondary education
- ▶ By 2030, ensure that all girls and boys complete free, equitable and quality primary and secondary education leading to relevant and effective learning outcomes
- 4.2 Early childhood development and universal pre-primary education
- By 2030, ensure that all girls and boys have access to quality early childhood development, care and pre-primary education so that they are ready for primary education
- 4.3 Equal access to technical/vocational and higher education
- ▶ By 2030, ensure equal access for all women and men to affordable and quality technical, vocational and tertiary education, including university
- 4.4 Relevant skills for decent work
- By 2030, substantially increase the number of youth and adults who have relevant skills, including technical and vocational skills, for employment, decent jobs and entrepreneurship
- 4.5 Gender equality and inclusion
- ▶ By 2030, eliminate gender disparities in education and ensure equal access to all levels of education and vocational training for the vulnerable, including persons with disabilities, indigenous peoples and children in vulnerable situations

- 4.6 Universal youth literacy
- ▶ By 2030, ensure that all youth and a substantial proportion of adults, both men and women, achieve literacy and numeracy
- 4.7 Education for sustainable development and global citizenship
- ▶ By 2030, ensure that all learners acquire the knowledge and skills needed to promote sustainable development, including, among others, through education for sustainable development and sustainable lifestyles, human rights, gender equality, promotion of a culture of peace and non-violence, global citizenship and appreciation of cultural diversity and of culture's contribution to sustainable development

Three means of implementation

- 4.a Effective learning environments
- Build and upgrade education facilities that are child, disability and gender sensitive and provide safe, non-violent, inclusive and effective learning environments for all
- 4.b Scholarships
- ▶ By 2020, substantially expand globally the number of scholarships available to developing countries, in particular least developed countries, small island developing States and African countries, for enrolment in higher education, including vocational training and information and communications technology, technical, engineering and scientific programs, in developed countries and other developing countries
- 4.c Teachers and educators
- ▶ By 2030, substantially increase the supply of qualified teachers, including through international cooperation for teacher training in developing countries, especially least developed countries and small island developing States



Contribution to GDP


- General government expenditure on education (current, capital, and transfers)
 is expressed as a percentage of total general government expenditure on all
 sectors (including health, education, social services, etc.). It includes
 expenditure funded by transfers from international sources to government.
- Nigeria education spending for 2021 was 5.14%, a 0.01% increase from 2020.
- Nigeria education spending for 2020 was 5.13%, a 0.72% decline from 2019.
- Nigeria education spending for 2019 was 5.86%, a 0.09% decline from 2018.
- Nigeria education spending for 2018 was 5.94%, a 0.18% decline from 2017.

Teacher shortages

- ► Teachers and students across the region are already struggling in overcrowded classrooms in schools that often lack the most basic amenities.
- According to UIS data, the average pupil-teacher ratio at primary level is 42 but rises to more than 60 in countries such as Central African Republic (80), Chad (62), Ethiopia (64), and Malawi (69). The ratio is much smaller at the secondary level (25), but this may well reflect low enrolment rates with the regional average standing at just 43.

Why do we have teaching shortages?

- Low pay need to increase incentive to attract more people into the profession
- Need to increase pride in profession
- Improved training, use of technology and innovation
- High population growth in Nigeria estimated to reach 450m by 2030 from 200+m in 2020
- Low spend on education at most levels
